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
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Dr. Charles Moore (Class of 1983) is driven to make a difference. In his role as a physician at a major public hospital, he saw the health disparities that many poor, urban people face—which can lead to a delay in getting necessary health care and the increased possibility of suffering a bleak outcome—and he decided to take action. He started by offering one-man healthcare out of his car in impoverished neighborhoods after work; soon after, he set up a clinic with help from like-minded colleagues. Then in 2012 Charles founded the HEALing Community Center in Atlanta, a joint effort with multiple local organizations that provide comprehensive health services as well as health education to provide a holistic



approach to better living, all offered on a free or sliding-scale basis.

The HEALing Center's goal is to meet people in their community, remove the barriers to getting healthcare, and craft a plan that meets each patient's individual needs. No transportation to the doctor's office? No specialist for your issue in your area? No insurance? No healthy eating options at your supermarket? HEALing can and will help – the center even offers fresh food from its garden.

The HEALing Center's staff makes it a goal to know their patients' names and assess their circumstances individually for the best treatment and outcomes.



Charles was interested in medicine from a very young age, practicing bandaging up family members as a toddler in his Nedrow home. He recalls his elementary school teachers Ms. Crippen and Ms. Raymond fondly, and counts Mr. Littlefield as one of his favorite teachers at OCS. He played saxophone in Jazz Band,

starting when he was eight. In fact, it was witnessing various speech and hearing difficulties at Pioneer that got him focused on his medical specialty.

After graduating from OCS as valedictorian, Charles went on to attend Union College as a biology major and music minor, and

ran track, sang in the chorus, worked on the yearbook, and even tried football for a season. His good deeds began early, too, as he tagged along with his sister as a volunteer at the Pioneer home for the deaf, blind and handicapped,

earned his MD from prestigious Harvard University. Today he is Chief of Otolaryngology (specialty in ear, nose and throat) at Grady Memorial Hospital as well as Professor of Head and Neck Surgery at Emory University

School of Medicine. Charles' accomplishments are many – including singing background for Michael Buble! - and a quick web search will lead you to his research papers and an informative video about the HEALING Center! Check them out!

You might spy Charles around town on occasion, as he visits upstate NY a few times each year to visit family, and he continues to enjoy fishing and being active in his church as he did as a youngster in Syracuse.

Charles sets a great example, as his work is making a positive impact in the lives of over 9,000 people who visit the HEALING

Community Center every year. Charles has advice for today's OCS students thinking about medicine: “Be passionate about this choice because it's a lot of work, but worthwhile if you truly love it. You can help many people in a lot of ways.” And no matter what field you choose, “Everyone has something to contribute – even small actions can lead to bigger and better things. Take that step to make a difference in people's lives.”

John Hourigan and Nancy (Joyce) Hourigan were honored for their many years of success and service in the agriculture community.

Starting with a rented farm and just 100 cows shortly after graduation, they now oversee 2500 head of cattle and 7500 acres of farmland. Always willing to try new technology, John and Nancy

have mentored numerous young men and women in agriculture and hosted visitors from all over the world to study their success.

They have been recognized by several organizations for their contributions to the community and have served as members of the United States Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency. Nancy was also chair of the NYS Farm Service Agency for eight years. They currently own and operate Bailiwick Market and Café, which utilizes local talent and serves fresh food from local farms.



SHERMAN SAUNDERS

CLASS OF 1937

Sherman Saunders began his career with W. F. Saunders & Sons and the Saunders Companies in 1942. The Saunders business

grew under Sherman's leadership from the original plant on South Onondaga Road to 13 plants across New York. The W. F. Saunders companies were responsible for numerous cutting-edge concrete mixes over the years. His innovative stone crushing and plant designs and vision for the future helped move the concrete business into the 21st century.

"Sherm" was well known for his generous contributions to the community including local little leagues, Boys and Girls Club, the South Onondaga and Nedrow Volunteer Fire Departments, and local parks, playgrounds and memorials.

At this year's Homecoming, Nancy and John Hourigan, along with the late Sherman Saunders, were honored with spots on the Wall of Distinction for their many contributions to the community.

ALUMNI NOTES:

PETER GUCKENHEIMER

CLASS OF 1959

Greetings: I am a person who likes to relive my past memories! I have an unusual past, being born in Palestine (now called Israel) on 2/20/1940 and coming to America in 1947 to NYC. My father was 47 years old and for the third time had to start his working life all over again. His first new start occurred when, being Jewish, he ran away from Nazi Germany. The second

occurred when war was coming to Israel from all the Arab Nations bordering it, and my father came to New York. Shortly after that, he got a new start as an electrical engineer at Syracuse General Electric in North Syracuse.

My Father was a genius with a master's degree in electrical engineering and was the last Jewish graduate from college in late 1932 when Hitler proclaimed that Jews were not allowed to go to college or practice their skill set. Fortunately for us, he left Germany in 1933 to go to England to get a job and apply for his visa paperwork there.

We bought our first house in Nedrow in 1950 on Lindbergh Road in one of the first house tracks of prefab

small homes. I went to Rockwell School to start in 5th grade, but essentially was a first-grader: I was seven years old and did not even speak English when we landed in NYC.

I started at Onondaga Central when I graduated from 6th grade. Another irony was that our OCS school guidance counselor, Ms Robinson,

told me shortly before graduation that I better find a trade school and learn a trade for a living.

I tried to enter the Architectural School at Syracuse University, but without math I could not get in. I got into Mohawk Tech which is now called Oneida Junior College.

To shorten this story, I felt like a “slow student” at OCS until I went to Mohawk Valley Tech, a two-year junior college in Utica, N.Y., from 1959 to graduation in 1961. From there I transferred to Syracuse University and earned a four-year degree in Graphic Design and a minor in Industrial Design in 1964.

I got married to my wife on campus at the Syracuse University in a non-



denominational wedding service because my Jewish parents would not attend a Catholic service. (My wife was a Catholic at the time.) On Sunday of our wedding weekend, we jumped into our used 1962 Corvair and drove to California with

\$200—and neither of us had a job. It was, ironically, 20 years after the Normandy Invasion of France on 6/6/1944!

I ended up working up my skill set to a level of a mechanical engineer at Hewlett Packard for 22.5 years

and almost completed my Master's Degree at Stanford University.

My life has been a great run, being married over 53 years to the same woman. We have one daughter, Alicia, born in 1968, and

a granddaughter Sophia, 18, who today had her first class at San Diego State University.
