WHERE ARE THEY NOW? DR. RICHARD ALEXANDER

Dr. Richard Alexander, OCS Class of '65, recently shared his memories and personal story with *Joyful Echoes*. He has lived his life through the lens of the golden rule — treat others how you wish to be treated.

Dr. Alexander, though now a Texan, has deep roots in the OCS community. Before

Onondaga was a consolidated school district, his father attended a one-room schoolhouse in the District. His older brother graduated just three years before him, and his younger brother followed a few years later. Growing up in South Onondaga, he woke up at the crack of dawn to trap muskrats in the creek before heading off to school.





Dr. Alexander recalled that during his time at OCS, "Wheeler Elementary was not yet constructed. The current junior-senior high school was a K-12 building." He remembers his time at OCS fondly because even as a shy child, he loved learning, jokingly adding that his love for school was pretty obvious because he didn't graduate from medical school until he was 35 years old.

Three of his favorite teachers were Max Metcalf, English; Mr. [Bill] Cook, history; and Tom LaClair, his wrestling coach. All three, he mentioned, "left remarkable impacts on my life." His teachers were strict, "but in a good way." These teachers engaged the student, prompting him not just to know the information but to know the "why." At OCS he ran track, played football, and wrestled, beginning at 103 pounds and competing at 130 pounds as a senior. He was co-captain of the wrestling team and captain of the track team. At that time, the OCS track, he recalled, was "just a dirt trail." After his graduation from OCS, he attended Syracuse University, majoring in zoology. In addition to his challenging course work, he was also a member of the wrestling team. He earned his master's degree in physiology before attending medical school at SUNY Upstate.

Before returning to Upstate to complete his cardiothoracic surgery residency, Dr. Alexander went to Galveston, Texas, to begin his general surgery residency through the University of Texas, where he earned the title of "Outstanding Resident." During his residency, he worked upwards of 100 hours a week with 36-hour shifts, but he added,

By age 35, he earned the title of doctor and was now a heart surgeon. Although it was a long time to be in school, Dr. Alexander explained why he chose this career. "I wanted to do whatever I could to help my patients," and added that he liked the opportunity "to stretch my abilities to see what I could do."

Dr. Alexander observed that he also enjoys the technical aspect of his field. "Even after 39 years, every day is different, no case is ever the same, and each case has its risks and challenges." He performs coronary bypass surgery, aortic and mitral valve surgery, aortic

"This was worth it because when you are in medical school, you are young and want to do it." He completed his residency in general surgery in 1981 and his residency in cardiothoracic surgery in 1983.

aneurysm surgery, carotid artery surgery, abdominal aneurysm surgery, endovascular aortic aneurysm repair, and endovascular harvesting of the leg vein for coronary surgery and surgery of the lung and esophagus. His skills

evolve every day both to meet the demands of new technology and to perfect procedures that are the least invasive as possible. He said, "It's amazing what medicine can do. We can replace valves and can stop the heart and almost always the heart starts working again. Then they wake up; the next day they walk around; a few more days later they are home. It is incredible what people can handle."

Over the years, he has chaired many positions in the Memorial Hermann Hospital in Texas, including being voted as Chief of Staff of the Southwest Branch. He also earned the title of Memorial Hermann Physician of the Year and chair of the Heart Surgeons Network in the greater Houston area.

Dr. Alexander has lived "the golden rule" throughout his career. He recalls working through numerous hurricanes in the Galveston area, tending to countless injured civilians and organizing 17 hospitals in moving patients from flooded facilities to his location. Beyond Texas, Dr. Alexander has led countless missionary trips. He first organized a charity called Faith in Practice, taking a team of doctors and students to provide lifesaving surgeries in Guatemala and El Salvador. Many surgeries performed were for hernias or surgeries for which the recovery could be left safely in the care of the local doctors. Any leftover medical equipment brought from the United States was left for the local hospitals.

Dr. Alexander and his wife, Dr. Charlotte Alexander, a hand surgeon, completed these missions for over 30 years, later

joining a surgical missionary team that traveled to the Philippines. The team performed an array of surgeries. In fact, Dr. Alexander once removed a thyroid that was well over two pounds! The surgical team would also be accompanied by dentists and opticians, providing patients more than 800 pairs of glasses donated on the trips. He believes now his life has come full circle, bringing him back to Syracuse to perform heart surgeries at Upstate Medical for about a week every month.

While not working long hours at the hospital, Dr. Alexander and his wife love enjoying the great outdoors by going hunting, fishing, camping—and even backpacking in their younger years. They have four children, and all have enjoyed success in their

personal endeavors. One daughter is a movie director in California. His other daughter is a pediatric ear, nose, and throat doctor in the Houston area. His sons both work in IT, one in North Carolina and the other in California.

Dr. Alexander appreciates a balance between family and work—but realizes that hard work does pay off, enabling him to enjoy life and live the values he acquired growing up in South Onondaga. After his years in a difficult profession, his advice is to treat others how you wish to be treated, especially offering criticism without being demeaning or insulting. He further added, "Do not give up. Give it a good old try because most of the time hard work pays off. There are bumps in the road, but you have to keep pushing."


MEMORIAL WAYNEL. FELLOWS

Joyful Echoes was saddened to learn that "Len" Fellows, Class of '65, passed away on October 1st. Butler-Badman handled his funeral arrangements, and readers may visit its website to read more about Len, including his service in the U. S. Army.

Back in 2011, Len wanted to find a way to serve the OCS community. He contacted our treasurer and inquired about the possibility of establishing an annual scholarship. Len made a sizable donation and asked the OCSEF to manage the money. Every year since 2012, the Fellows Scholarship has provided a graduating senior \$500. Len's gift helped many kids have an easier time during their freshman year, whether the money was used for textbooks or tuition or any of the other expenses students incur. Len occasionally replenished his original fund with new money to protect the Fellows endowment and maintain the annual gift at \$500.

In the 1960's, graduating seniors would describe themselves in the OCS yearbook on a page called "Life at Central." In 1965 that page listed each student's "pet peeve." Len's pet peeve was "People Who Say No." Len certainly said "Yes" to the OCS community through his caring and generosity.
